The Pontiff highlighted the interconnectedness of environmental and social issues and the urgent need to address climate change, pollution and biodiversity loss.


He criticised technocrats who elevate technology over ecology before calling for sustainable development, and a more integrated approach to human and environmental well-being.

Impact of Pope's 'Laudato Si' letter on Uganda

It is now 10 years since Pope Francis issued *Laudato Si.* But has this globally acknowledged pastoral letter made any impact on Ugandans and their sensitivity to climate change?

Apparently, yes. Today, if you attend a Catholic Mass or conference, it is unlikely that you will go back without hearing the homilist or conference speaker alluding to Pope Francis' environmental conservation ideas in Laudato Si.

The Church has also taken action to address the climate change issues that the late Pope Francis issued in the letter. For example, many Catholic-oriented schools



and other institutions have established *Laudato Si* clubs.

Through these clubs, the students come up with

strategic advocacy and practical initiatives and innovations for ecological conservation. The clubs are active in schools such as Trinity College Nabbingo, Our Lady of Good Counsel Senior Secondary School Gayaza, Holy Cross Lake View Senior Secondary School Jinja, St Mary's College Kisubi and Uganda Martyrs High School Lubaga.

More so, the education department of Kampala Archdiocese has, over the past two years, dedicated the annual diocesan education week to environmental conservation awareness.

Martyrs Catholic Shrine
Munyonyo, in Makindye
Division. The function
was presided over by the
