

Deputy IGG decries teacher absenteeism

The Deputy Inspector General of Government (IGG), Dr Patricia Okiria, has decried teacher absenteeism, saying it occasions a huge loss to the Government.

While presiding over the 13th National Speech and Debate Championship (NSDC) at King's College Budo in Wakiso district last week, Okiria disclosed that absenteeism costs the education sector sh1.5 trillion annually.

"Be the eyes and ears of the IGG in the fight against corruption. Speak out when you witness something wrong," Okiria said.

The deputy IGG said the youth play a critical role in the fight against corruption, noting that Uganda, with over 78% of its population aged below 30, has its future resting squarely


in their hands.
