At four months old, the baby started experiencing inconsolable crying, and rapid breathing during feeding.

Baby Kwagala was diagnosed with two holes in the heart. His parents are seeking sh18m to enable him undergo open-heart surgery at the Mulago Heart Institute.

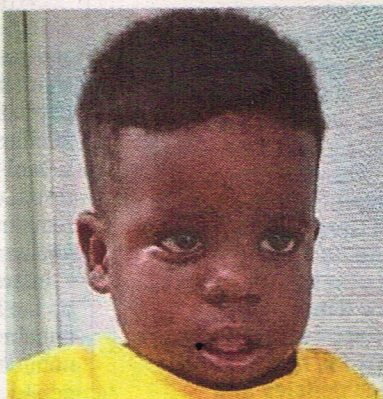

Where did Ponsiano's mother go?

Zahara Mageya, a resident of Sebina zone in Kalerwe, a Kampala suburb, says the child's mother — known to her only as Kemigisha — was someone she met at Christian Life Church, Makerere-Kavule.

Kemigisha approached Mageya and requested her to look after her child as she went to look for a job. When Kemigisha was chased out of the church where she used to sleep, she never returned to pick up her child.

Mageya reported the incident to Kalerwe Police Station under the child welfare office and the child was referred to Teresa Children's Home for protection. The child was named Ponsiano Mulungi. To help in searching for his family, contact 0751272703.

Mulungi was left at washing bay

Mulungi was abandoned at a washing bay in Mirembe zone, Nateete, Kampala, in April 2024 by his father.

Hassan Mubiru, who saw the child's father, said the man approached him and requested that he watch over his son, promising to return shortly but never came back.

The case of child abandonment was later reported to Nateete Police Station for further management.

The child was referred to Teresa Children's Home for safe custody, where he was named Ham Mulungi.

Calvin was found in a store

On May 28 last year, a baby boy about three months old was discovered in a store of a deserted house in Nateete, a Kampala City suburb.

The child was rescued by a good Samaritan, Hope Nalubega, and the matter was reported to Nateete Police Station under the Child and Family Protection Unit.

The Probation Officer of Rubaga Division later handed the baby over to Teresa Children's Home in Kabowa for safety. He was named Calvin Mulungi and is now eight months old.

On July 11, 2023, a baby boy who was about two weeks old was dumped at Mutundwe Christian Fellowship Church in Mutundwe, by his mentally ill mother, Phionah Namuyinga, who later disappeared.

Eight-year-old Edrine Mutesasira's heart valves were damaged and weakened by bacteria, a condition doctors describe as infective endocarditis. His valves need to be replaced with artificial ones in India.
