

How Monitor's Excel in PLE boosted results at Alebtong school

LIRA. Glory Primary School, a modest private school tucked away in Alebtong District, has once again defied expectations with an outstanding performance in the 2025 Primary Leaving Examinations (PLE), earning praise from parents, educationists and the wider community.

Founded in 2014 and registered as a Uganda National Examinations Board (Uneb) centre in 2018, the school began its journey with makeshift classrooms and limited resources.

Despite these humble beginnings, Glory Primary School has steadily built a reputation for academic excellence, consistently producing strong PLE re-

sults.

This year's performance has further cemented its status as one of the stand-out schools in northern Uganda. Of the 40 candidates who sat the 2025 PLE, 17 passed in Division One, 22 in Division Two and only one in Division Three, an achievement that places the school well above national averages.

Among the top performers was Lawrence Opio, who scored an impressive aggregate of seven. He obtained a Distinction One in English, a Distinction One in Mathematics, a Distinction Two in Social Studies, and a Credit Three in Science.

Andrew Ocen also posted strong results, earning Distinction Two in English and Science, Credit Three in Social Studies and Distinction One in Mathe-

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matics.

Another candidate, Abraham Owiny, scored an aggregate eight, with Distinction One in Mathematics and English, alongside Credit Three in Science and Social Studies.

An analysis of the results shows a striking pattern: all 17 candidates who attained Division One earned either Distinction One or Distinction Two in Eng-

lish, underscoring the school's strong emphasis on language proficiency.

Education observers say such performance reflects disciplined teaching methods and focused exam preparation.

Glory Primary School's director, Mr George Oruk, credited the achievement to the commitment of teachers and the effective use of revision materials, including the Monitor Excel in PLE magazine.

"The magazine has helped our learners understand exam trends, sharpen their answering techniques and build confidence," Mr Oruk said.
